**Dear Friends of the Fredericksburg Nature Center,**

No matter what Punxsutawney Phil suggested last month, our central Texas spring has been delayed, likely because of the cool February temperatures and the lack of substantial rainfall since last October. Our Purple Martins finally arrived in early March several weeks late. I will boldly predict that the Bluebonnet crop will be little to none. Those early rosettes that did appear in October have languished all winter thirsting for rain. From our Spring clarion species, Redbuds that tried to bud in late February were thwarted by the freezes, and the grape Kool-aid aroma of the Mountain Laurels is yet to be prevalent. Spring's delay will only make us appreciate it so much more when it unfolds in a renewal of nature and its human denizens.

Spring has already generated a flurry of activity around FNC and within our organization. Our volunteers are readying the gardens for the Spring bloom. We have a renewal of our educational programs with Lee Haile appearing on April 2nd and a guided tour on April 23rd. We will also be hosting the Hill Country Master Naturalist class on April 12th for a tour, so our volunteers are in high gear in preparation.

We are very thankful for receipt of a \$300 seed grant from the Wildflower Center in partnership with Native American Seed which will fund re-seeding our Butterfly Bench pocket prairie with grasses and flowers.

The newsletter is a bit shortened this month but will resume in full next month. Our feature story writer called in sick at the last minute! We are always looking for article submissions by guest writers, so get out the quill and ink, and get to work!

Finally, thanks to all of you who have renewed your memberships or donated to the Bill Lindemann Capital Fund. Your support makes all of our work possible—a big thanks!

## Observations Along the Trail

The banks of Live Oak Creek adjacent to our trails are luxuriously lined by prized native grasses like **Switchgrass** or **Giant Sedge (aka Sawgrass)**. These grasses/sedges anchor the creek banks and mark it as a healthy riparian zone able to withstand floods while holding the soil bank. Standing up in the foreground with rusty brown coloring is **Bushy Bluestem**, another valued wetland grass. **The lesson—Don't mow down those creek-side grasses.**

Finally a Spring bloom! With a cooler than normal February and no significant rain since October, the Spring flowers are late or not blooming at all. This lone flower is our common **Yellow Wood Sorrel (*Oxalis dillenii*)**. It may be common, but it's welcome!

## Bird Happenings at FNC



**Great Egret (*Ardea alba*)** Our elegant year-round resident stalks its prey and then makes a deadly jab with its spear like bill. Great Egrets were hunted nearly to extinction for their plumes in the late nineteenth century, sparking conservation movements and some of the first laws to protect birds. The Great Egret is the symbol of the National Audubon Society. The size, white feathers, black legs and yellow bill help identify it.



**Canada Goose (*Branta canadensis*)** This semi-resident pair just re-appeared at the lake after a winter absence. They do not migrate north but might have moved slightly north during the fall molt or simply camped out at a nearby location. We have a gaggle of 25 that lives year-round east of Fredericksburg. This species are rowdy "honkers" which sometimes resembles a barking dog.

## Bird Lover Tip of the Month

**Lights Out Texas!** The bird spring migration has begun and will last from March 1 to June 15 with the most critical period being April 22 to May 12. I don't believe that I have to argue the ecological benefits of birds nor highlight the immense joy and beauty that they have provided human culture through the ages.

Yet our highly illuminated modern civilization negatively affects their migration. Excessive artificial light at night (ALAN) disorients birds during migration. Bright lights at night on buildings attract birds like porch lights attract moths, which can result in fatal collisions.

### What can you do to help?

1. Turn off all non-essential lights from 11:00pm to 6:00am during this period.
2. Install Dark Sky friendly lighting when possible.
3. For essential security and safety lighting, use dark skies friendly lighting practices that will lessen their impact.
