


Our Texas State Bird is not the Friendly Type!



The scientific name of the Northern Mockingbird is Mimus polyglottos in recognition of its ability to mimic other sounds & accumulate up to 200 songs in a lifetime. Males & specifically unmated males ceaselessly sing all day long in to the night & even offer a unique spring & fall repertoire. In the 19th C. they were sold & kept in cages as songbirds.

Our Texas state motto is *Friendship*, but that criteria was not applied when choosing our state bird. Northern Mockingbirds are aggressive year round & will forcefully protect their territory against other males, bird species, cats, dogs, & occasionally the unwitting human.

Texas Prickly Pear

Opuntia engelmannii

var. lindheimeri

Our most common"pear" is a pollen factory that attracts binging insects.
The ethereal blooms almost make you forget about those prickly spines.

Bigroot or Twist-spine Prickly Pear

Opuntia macrorhiza

A less visible species because it grows in low clumps of 10" height & 3' width amongst grass.


<u>Project Mission:</u> To provide enhanced environmental learning programming for our youth and citizens in a new community education facility.

City Council Approves FNC Interpretive Center!

On May 21st, the Fredericksburg City Council unanimously approved a development agreement with the **Friends of Fredericksburg Nature Center (FFNC)** to construct an Interpretive Center facility at Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park. The agreement allows FFNC to move forward with construction and landscaping of the surrounding area funded by donations and grants to be solicited by FFNC. Upon completion of construction, FFNC will turn the building over to the City for ownership, ongoing maintenance, and staffing (Director and Educational Programmer).

FFNC has been steadily moving forward with this project for almost two years from its inception. Initial actions including forming an Advisory Committee consisting of now 21 community members, visiting area nature centers to gather ideas, and soliciting input from community stakeholders. Subsequently, we developed a scope statement encapsulating a set of features to be incorporated into the facility along with educational programming that we would implement. **Our project themes focus on Community, Education, and Nature.** FFNC in conjunction with City staff will provide more extensive programming for our youth with a goal of creating our land stewards of tomorrow dedicated to preserving our natural resources.

In August, 2023, FFNC engaged **Brandon Weinheimer of SKT Architects** as our project architect and **Dunaway** as the landscape architect and subsequently began **Conceptual/Schematic Design** which is nearing completion. The outcome of this phase includes a site plan depicting the building location with landscaping, a building layout, and a visual rendering. The next phase will be **Detailed Design** which will create detailed drawings in preparation for construction. FFNC has also hired **Guido Construction** as our general contractor, and **Scott Clarke Of Clarke Design** as our exhibits designer/fabricator/installer.



Project Themes = Community, Education, and Nature

FFNC is currently working on organizing our fundraising campaign to support construction of the facility. The initiation of construction will be contingent upon raising the necessary funds, while construction is projected to require approximately one year.
